## Message from Mayor Randall W. Teague



Welcome to the first installment of the *Haddon Press* for 2010. The *Press* is a valuable instrument that allows the Township and the School District to communicate directly with

our citizens. The *Press* also allows us to update the public on various issues in town. The most commonly asked question I hear is "What is going on with the Dy-Dee site?" While you may not visibly see a lot happening at the Dy-Dee site, significant progress is occurring.

For any municipality, redevelopment can be a very complex, costly and time-consuming issue, especially when the site to be redeveloped has been abandoned for more than twenty years and is contaminated. With regard to the Dy-Dee site, the Redevelopment Agreement with Fieldstone Associates also requires the acquisition of a number of properties surrounding the site, which has made the process even more complicated and time-consuming.

During the acquisition period, we discovered that several properties included within the site to be developed, are, like Dy-Dee, also contaminated. This has complicated the acquisition of these properties. There was also a property owner, Sulock (State Farm), challenging its inclusion within the site. I am happy to report that we have settled out of court with Mr. Sulock and purchased his property at the end of December.

# United States® Census 2010

## Message from Commissioner John C. Foley

While most citizens understand the importance of voting, they underestimate the importance of participating in our nation's census. From my perspective as the Commissioner responsible for Revenue and Finance, I encourage all of our residents to complete their census in order for Haddon Township to receive appropriate state and federal funding. Residents are urged to promptly complete and return the forms by mail when they receive them this March.

Did you know that the Township of Haddon had significant under-reporting in the last census? The Philadelphia Census Bureau reports that we had only a 64% rate of return. Over the past decade, approximately \$10,000 in government

## IT'S EASY BEING GREEN!

### At the 2nd Annual Haddon Township Green Event.

They will be vacating the property in March and moving their offices to a nearby location.

An environmental investigation and clean-up for a site such as Dy-Dee can take years and cost millions of dollars. The environmental investigation alone for the Dy-Dee site will total over two million dollars. We have been successful in obtaining grants from the State for the entire amount of the environmental investigation.

**Haddon Township has already received over two and a half million dollars in grant funding.**

In addition, we have successfully pursued a Brownfield Development Area designation through the New Jersey Department of Environmental Protection (DEP) and were one of only three municipalities in the state awarded BDA status for 2009. **The BDA designation enables us to streamline the environmental investigation and clean up through DEP and provides 75% funding for the remediation of the site (Fieldstone Associates will pay the remaining 25%).**

Recently, our Remedial Action Work Plan for the Dy-Dee site was approved by the DEP. What does this mean? As soon as the ground thaws, the clean-up of the Dy-Dee site will finally begin. After more than twenty years, our goal of a “clean” Dy-Dee site will be realized.

Fieldstone Associates are pursuing final site plan approvals before the Planning and Zoning board. Once site plan approval is given, the remediation is completed and the final properties acquired; the site will be sold to Fieldstone Associates. In turn, the Township’s acquisition bond will be paid off and construction can begin. The Towne Center at Haddon will revitalize this area as a transit village and will become a catalyst for economic growth for our downtown. The plan consists of residential housing, commercial retail space and accessory parking facilities.

The revitalization of Haddon Avenue is a top priority of this Administration. We are working diligently on plans that will generate long-term sustainable revenue for our town for years to come. Our vision is for a more cohesive, attractive and vibrant downtown---one we can walk to, gather around and prosper from.

financial support was lost for each person who did not return his census, resulting in as much as 40 million dollars in lost funding opportunities for our Township. This under-reporting resulted in lost opportunities for Title 1 funding, Head Start programs, federal road construction projects, senior citizen programs and public health initiatives. With the tremendous growth and changes in our community over the past decade and our ambitious plans for the future of this town, it is imperative that we receive appropriate representation and adequate government funding through an accurate census. When you do the math, it's easy to see what an accurate count of residents can do for our community. Better infrastructure...more services...a brighter tomorrow for everyone.

With one of the shortest questionnaires in history, the 2010 Census asks for name, gender, age, race, ethnicity, relationship, and whether you own or rent your home. It takes only about 10



minutes for the average household to complete. You are required by law to respond to the 2010 Census questionnaire. All responses are used for statistical purposes only and kept strictly confidential. The Census Bureau is prohibited by law from sharing personal information with anyone, including any government or law enforcement agencies.

**Reasons for residents to participate are:**

- The federal government uses census numbers to allocate more than \$300 billion in federal funds annually for community programs and services, such as education, housing and community development, health care services for the elderly, job training and more.
- State and local governments use census information for planning and allocating funds for new school construction, libraries and other public buildings, highway safety and public transportation systems, new roads and bridges, location of police and fire departments, and many other projects. An accurate count is needed for Haddon Township to get sufficient federal and state funds for township and school district services.
- Community organizations use census information to develop social service programs, community action projects, senior lunch programs and child-care centers.

- The numbers help businesses identify where to locate factories, shopping centers, movie theaters, banks and offices—activities that often lead to new jobs.
- The census totals are used to determine how many seats each state will have in the U.S. House of Representatives.

## Participate in your Local Government

In addition to the elected Board of Commissioners, Haddon Township has several other boards and commissions that citizens are encouraged to join. These additional boards/commissions include the Planning/Zoning Board, the Rent Control Board, the Housing Authority Board, the Environmental Commission, the Shade Tree Commission, the Community Dispute Resolution Committee, the Business Improvement District Advisory Board, and the Civic Celebration Committee.

On October 19, 2009, the State of New Jersey introduced the "Citizen Service Act" which required municipalities to standardize the application process for its various boards and commissions. To meet these new requirements, Haddon Township has created a new Citizen Leadership Form which citizens can download from our website or pick up from the Tax Office at the Municipal Building. To apply to one of these boards/commissions, applicants must submit this form, a letter of interest, and a resume to the Mayor. ### Swimming Pool Requirements

With the summer months approaching quickly, it is time for outdoor activities, including swimming. An average of 280 children under the age of 5 drown each year in swimming pools, and there is an increasing number of deaths in inexpensive, inflatable pools. Parents need to be aware that any pool poses a risk to young children. The sides of inflatable pools are flexible and sometimes slanted or low, so it may be easier for a child to climb inside.



All residents should be aware of safety policies for swimming pools. As of January 17, 2006 section 3109.2 of the International Building

code and section AG102.1 of the International Residential Code 2000 define a swimming pool as "any structure intended for swimming or recreational bathing that can hold water 24 inches or more in depth. This includes in-ground, above ground, and on ground inflatable swimming pools, hot tubs and spas." This includes any pool that is "CAPABLE" of being more than 24" in depth including the commonly used blow-up pool.

We regret to inform you that this means your blow-up pool requires a building permit and a proper 5' pool barrier. Additionally, the filter system must be wired in accordance with 2008 NEC. If it is not, an electrical permit may also be required to install the proper outlet.

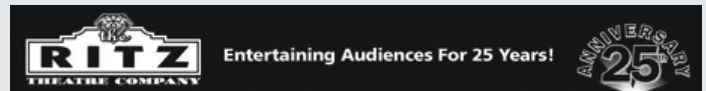
New Business Coming Soon to Haddon Township!

## Storm water Management



In accordance with the Township's Tier A Municipal Storm water General Permit, the Governing Body has adopted various Ordinances to regulate the impact of storm water and pollutants on the environment. As part of our required Local Public Education Program, we are highlighting the requirements

and environmental benefits of these Ordinances. The following describes the Ordinances in the Municipal Code:

**Pet Waste:** This Ordinance requires all pet owners to pick up and properly dispose of pet waste dropped on public or private property. This requirement prevents fecal contamination from impacting our local waterways.

**Litter:** This Ordinance states that it is unlawful to throw, drop, discard, or otherwise place litter of any nature on any public or private property, other than a litter receptacle. This requirement has been adopted to prevent all types of litter from cluttering public streets and private property and prevents litter from impacting our waterways.

**Improper Disposal of Waste:** This Ordinance states that it is illegal to dispose of waste in any place other than a proper solid waste storage container. The purpose of this Ordinance is to prevent unsanitary conditions and groundwater pollution.

**Wildlife Feeding:** Feeding of water fowl on municipal park land or property is prohibited by Ordinance. The purpose of

this Ordinance is reduce water fowl population in response to health concerns regarding bacteria from fecal matter which is harmful to humans and fish populations.

**Yard Waste:** This Ordinance has been created to establish a system for the placement and collection of leaves, brush, and other yard wastes. The purpose of the Ordinance is to keep leaves, grass and other yard waste out of the storm water inlets and piping, and ultimately out of our waterways.

**Illicit Connections:** It is unlawful to connect any pipe or discharge to the municipal storm sewer system that is intended to discard, spill, or dump any substance other than storm water or groundwater (via sump discharge) into the system. The purpose of this Ordinance is to prevent contamination of our streams and waterways which receive discharge from our storm sewers.

The transport of pollutants into local streams and water bodies can result in the destruction of fish, wildlife, and habitats; threats to public health and the loss of recreational and aesthetic value.

The Governing Body has enacted the above listed Ordinances to protect our environment, and to keep pollutants that are commonly conveyed by storm water from adversely impacting our waterways and groundwater supplies. These ordinances can be found in the Chapter 202 of the Municipal Code of the Township of Haddon or on the official Township web site. ## Shade Tree Commission

In one of Dr. Seuss's books, a mossy little creature called the Lorax watches out for the trees. In Haddon Township, the Shade Tree Commission has the same role and is responsible for approving tree work along streets as well as implementing new plantings.

Anyone wanting to cut, plant or prune a tree needs to pick up an application from the Township Hall. If you're planting your own tree, please also pick up a list of approved and banned street trees. Final approval of permits for removing street trees requires an inspection by the Shade Tree Commission first.

If you prefer the township to do the tree work, please call or email the Shade Tree Commission. For pruning and removals, the STC will review and rate the tree. The Department of Public Works will then put the tree on the work order list in order of hazard rating and intake. Almost all of the high-hazard trees have been removed from the streets, and now DPW is focusing on the additional removals and pruning. Please do not paint X's on street trees. That is the responsibility of the STC in concert with the Department of Public Works.



One of the more rewarding tasks of the Shade Tree Commission is planting trees. Many existing trees are dying in town because of the old age and disease, and re-establishing our "suburban forest" is important because of the air quality improvement and natural air conditioning provided by the trees. Studies have also shown that house values increase when trees are in front of the houses. If you would like the Shade Tree Commission to plant a tree along the street in front of your house (in the Township right-of-way), call the STC, and your house address will be added to the waiting list.

### Recent STC Accomplishments:

- Planted 92 street trees in 2009 and assisted the Business Improvement District with 32.
- Planted 30 small trees along a tributary of Newton Creek to restore riparian habitat.
- Developed a sidewalk repair strategy
- Distributed white pine seedlings at the block party for residents to plant in their yards.
- Enabled each Shade Tree Commissioner to obtain C.O.R.E. training from the New Jersey Shade Tree Federation.
- Inspected existing trees and rated them for pruning or removal.
- Implemented a list of approved and banned street trees.

The approved tree list has over 70 species and includes native trees such as Swamp White Oak, Seedless Honey Locust, disease resistant American Elm, Canada Red Cherry, and Cumulus Shadblow. Non-native species include tough street trees such as Green Vase Zelkova, seedless Ginkgo, and Queen Elizabeth Maple. Banned street trees include Silver Maple (weak wooded and clogs sewer pipes), and non-native invasive species such as Bradford and Aristocrat Pears that spread in wild areas (seeds of various trees can travel via air, bird and runoff).

The STC is looking forward to planting 100 street trees in 2010. "It's good to be green."

## School Board Elections

Similar to last year's scenario, the School Board/ School Budget election date is being heavily contested by the New Jersey Legislature. At the time of this printing, the Legislature is in the process of deciding whether school board elections will be required for districts submitting budgets at or within the state-mandated cap of four percent. There is also discussion whether these elections should occur during their usual third Tuesday of April or during the November general election. Unless the Legislature decides otherwise in the upcoming weeks, our spring elections will occur in April as usual.

If and when voters go to the polls on Tuesday, April 20, 2010, they will be voting to fill three positions on the Haddon

Township School Board. Unfortunately at the time of this printing, the nomination process was not complete and the full list of candidates was not available. When the nomination process is complete in early March, the list of candidates will be posted online at [www.haddon.k12.nj.us](http://www.haddon.k12.nj.us) and advertised in both *What's On* and *The Retrospect* newspapers.

If more than three candidates are running for office, the Zone PTA will host a Candidates' Night. Information regarding this event will be distributed through the schools, posted on the schools website and published in the local papers. If you miss the Candidates' presentations that evening, tune into Comcast Channel 19 or Verizon Channel 46 in the following weeks to view their dialogue.

Please vote in the School Board and School budget elections on April 20, 2010. ### State of District Technology: The New Electricity



During a planning session about technology in the district, Dr. Mark Raivetz, Dr. Lisa Palmer, Steve Chard, and Lara Hill were reflecting on the massive transformation the implementation of technology has had on education and society. Dr. Raivetz stated that technology has become as ubiquitous as electricity. At the Board of Education meeting on October 15, 2009 during the State of District Technology presentation, Steve Chard and Lara Hill took this a bit further calling it the "new electricity." Just as society went through massive changes when electricity was introduced into school and homes, so too our society has moved through massive changes with the introduction of technology such as personal computers, iPods, and the Internet.

To implement the "New Electricity" in our school district the Technology Department spent this past summer upgrading or installing the following:

- Network upgrade throughout the district
- Internet upgrades at the high school and the middle school
- New computer labs at Jennings and Stoy schools
- Over 85 new teacher stations
- Upgraded hardware

The major project this past year was the selection, installation and training on a new Student Information System: *OnCourse*. This system benefits the faculty, students and parents with:

- A Parent Portal that provides more information.
- A Lesson Planner that is digital, sharable, searchable and archival, with reporting that ties directly to the NJ Core Curriculum Content Standards.



- Student Statistics that allow us to import data from various standardized tests.
- These statistics are customizable, providing multiple types of comparisons and are sharable with administrators and teachers.
- Data Management that provides daily school reports along with state, and federally mandated reports that are easily generated utilizing our available students' grade and attendance data . This data can also be easily exported to other programs utilized by accrediting agencies and the State and Federal Education Department.

This program is efficient, user-friendly, and accessible in addition to providing one-stop shopping for our numerous communications and reporting needs.



- Helps the district “go green” by reducing the need to print.
- Although we expect *OnCourse* to provide extensive opportunities to improve our educational process, we are still faced with some enormous challenges:
- *OnCourse* focuses on the need for parents to login to receive information instead of automatically being notified via email when changes occur.
- Since there are greater possibilities, resulting in additional users, more training and extra usage, there are added needs stretching an over-extended technology staff.
- Greater dependency on technology stretches limited resources resulting in greater needs for more equipment, more time, and more staffing at a time of dwindling budgets.

The district has received a significant amount of money from the Federal American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 with specific requirements for how the funds are to be used. The district is planning on using these stimulus funds to nurture student learning through:

- *SmartBoards* in special education and resource classrooms; remaining classrooms for grades 3 through 5; and a number of classrooms in the middle school and the high school.



- Laptops for special education teachers
- Upgrade teacher stations
- Update Graphic Design / CAD computer labs
- Additional Computer tables
- Instructional Software including Lexia reading support software, Study Island software, Development File tracking in *OnCourse*, Software to supplement NJCCCS

Finally, our public face for the district will be revitalized this spring with an entire redesign of our website resulting in improvements in appearance and navigation.

None of this would be possible without the community, and we are extremely grateful for that support. The massive growth

with technology - our “new electricity” - that the district will experience throughout this school year will continue to support student learning and the management of information to inform instruction. Thank you again for helping us to install more switches to light the way for our children!

## School District Digital Communications

This year Haddon Township School District has upgraded our Student Information System by introducing a new program called *OnCourse*. The parent side of this program is called *My Grade Portal* ([www.mygradeportal.com](http://www.mygradeportal.com)). One handy feature of *OnCourse* is that once logged on, parents can view all of their children, regardless of school. This program is a web-based program and gives parents and students access to grades, attendance, and homework. In addition, each teacher can add additional information such as documents used in classes, information about special projects and any other information that might be helpful to parents and students.

In addition to the *OnCourse* program, each school and the district still maintain the Edline website. These websites contain useful information about the operations of the school district. It is a great place to find calendar information, flyers and forms that are needed for each school and links to important sites such as *My Grade Portal*. This year, there is no login required and there is still plenty of valuable information available there. The final component in the online communication effort is e-mail. If you ever need to get in touch with a teacher or administrator in the district, there is a very simple formula for e-mail addresses. The formula is the teacher's first initial followed by the teacher's last name followed by [haddon.k12.nj.us](mailto:haddon.k12.nj.us). All teachers check e-mail on a regular basis; it is often the most efficient means of communicating with teachers.

Rohrer Middle School is utilizing two other means of communicating with parents and students. One is the online electronic newsletter entitled *RMS Weekly*. This publication is available at the RMS Edline website [www.edline.net/pages/rohrer](http://www.edline.net/pages/rohrer). This is a new feature that is prepared each Monday. It contains information about the school and a full schedule of two weeks worth of events at the school. It also has a weekly feature for parents and students that offer tips and suggestions for a successful middle school experience.

The other means of communication that Rohrer Middle School provides is the daily telephone hotline. Each day the office staff prepares a recorded message that is available by dialing **856-869-7750 extension 8400**. This recorded message contains all of the daily announcements that are made in school that day. This may be especially helpful to a parent trying to keep up with her child's daily activity when she is not near a computer.

The final component to the Haddon Township's effort to communicate in the 21st century environment is a system called *Global Connect*. This is the electronic version of a "phone chain". When implemented by a district administrator, important news about school events, such as school closings

or delayed openings, can be conveyed to all members of the Haddon Township School District community using information that parents have supplied to the school. You may have already heard Dr. Raivetz's voice in a recorded message or seen an e-mail with the sender *Global Connect*. That is our automated communication system at work.

Technology affords us many ways to communicate and keep up with how our children are doing. It is our hope that by sharing some of these strategies, you will find yourself better informed about what is happening throughout our school district. If you would like even more information about any of these communication tools, please call any of the schools offices. We would be happy to help you!

## More Recognition for HTHS



In case you missed it, *Philadelphia Magazine* recently recognized Haddon Township High School as one of the best schools in the area. Specifically, the editors looked at secondary schools in our eight-county Delaware Valley area. Their researchers first considered SAT scores. Data was also examined in the follow-

ing areas: enrollment; percentage of students going to a two- or four-year college; percentage of 11th grade students ranked proficient or above in state assessment tests; number of subjects in which students took AP exams; number of varsity sports; number of clubs and activities; student-faculty ratio; overall expenditure per student; percentage of expenditures dedicated to instruction; teacher education level; and percentage of students eligible for free lunch.

Each school received a standardized value for each category; then, predetermined weights were applied to each category to compute an overall standardized Z-score. When all of the numbers were crunched, HTHS was assigned a #17 ranking. While it is certainly nice to be ranked in the upper echelon of any "Best of" top 50, I can't help but feel a bit uncomfortable when schools receive rankings based on numbers alone. Before this article came out, I was invited, along with the other area administrators, to brag about just a few things that capture the true spirit of our schools. While the decision to respond was easy enough, it was quite difficult to limit my examples. In the end, I chose to highlight: The Annual Visual and Performing Arts Extravaganza, the HTHS Blood Donation Program, and the bi-annual Empty Bowls Dinner as

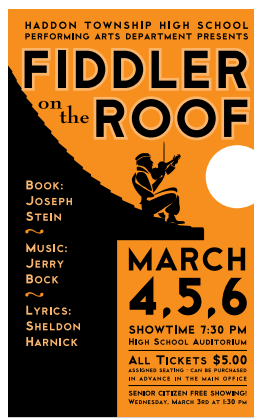

## **Message from Dr. Mark Raivetz**

### **The 2010-11 Budget**

New Jersey's long-standing budget deficit has been established as somewhere between \$6 to \$8 billion. Very large numbers indeed; but somewhat abstract. The impact of that deficit on our school budget promises to be dramatic, and very real. The Board and administration are struggling to prepare a budget that – even at “best case” – may result in a district without programs and services that have come to define us as a community. With the difficulty being that the degree of control we have over any spending plan for 2010-11 is limited on one side by the state's very real financial crisis; and on the other side by a legislated hard cap

on local taxes and rules making it nearly impossible to ask the community to do more in the form of a second budget question.

Here are some numbers to consider. The district receives about \$425,000 monthly subsidy from the state. For the last three years, the state held back the June payment for all school districts until the first week in July; using this accounting measure as a way to help its own balance sheet. The net result for local districts is an annual state aid payment missed – now up to three yet to be received. As I write this, we have learned of the near certainty that for 2009-10 a second aid payment will be withheld, with directions that the district use what the state refers to as “excess school surplus” to make up the second state aid payment. The district shut down all non-essential spending in mid-December, and does not carry a large surplus as State law restricts such balances to no more than two percent. Those dollars in the budget exceeding the two percent surplus after the annual audit constitute the fund balance. And because these are dollars that are not spent during the previous school year, they are annually returned to the community in the form of Tax Relief the following school year. We do not hold unspent Haddon Township Tax dollars. We return them the next year to help offset taxes. Two years ago, for example, these dollars were returned to this community to the extent that instead of requesting the maximum 4% increase in local taxes, the increase was 1.8%. For next year, even with a local tax increase of 4%, (\$793,000) we will begin 2010-11 with a smaller budget because the excess fund balance will no longer be available to carry forward. The state already took it to help reduce its own deficit. A smaller budget translates into fewer programs and services for students.

Last year at this time, we were also struggling with how to maintain that Haddon Township Education for which we are so proud to be a part. The situation was grave then, even without the loss of the second state aid payment. We were on the edge of a cliff, only to be rescued by ARRA stimulus fund dollars. A one-time, non-recurring save of \$1,335,352 that essentially plugged what was a major hole in the budget. There is no expectation at this time that we will see any additional dollars for 2010-11. It could be as late as the third or even fourth week in March before we have a real sense of our state funding. We may find ourselves longing for the good old days when we could debate funding an additional assistant coach or school trip.

I tell new teachers that to choose public education as a life's work is to be an optimist. And so I remain. As such, to close on a positive note, I offer this: We are Haddon Township. We are resilient. Our community values its schools. Our children will arrive as they do every September, ready to learn – and a dedicated staff of professionals will be there teach and to support them. ## Thoughts on High School Recognition and the 2010–2011 Budget

### Message from Superintendent Dr. Mark Raivetz



High school recognition and the 2010-11 budget may appear at first glance to be topics unrelated. Yet maintaining a high quality public school district during these economic times in New Jersey promises to be a challenge unlike any that we have faced. Governor Christy is not to be envied. The result of cumulative short-term fixes by administrations and legislatures in Trenton going back to the late 1980s, in combination with an economy still looking to find its way, has brought us to a new place. For the first time ever, communities throughout New Jersey will be asked to pay higher taxes to support school districts that can only offer fewer programs and services to students. First, the good news.

As a public school district, we take great pride in the academic, athletic, artistic, musical and community service accomplishments of our students. It is especially nice when these accomplishments are recognized by those outside of Haddon Township. Sometimes it is a new family, relocating to the community after researching towns and school districts in the Philadelphia suburbs – telling us that their research led them to

Haddon Township. Other times the recognition comes from a veteran teacher; one who started her career in another district and made application to teach in our schools – giving up tenure for the chance to work in Haddon Township and teach our children. And every now and then, the recognition comes from an unexpected source. Last fall, *Philadelphia Magazine's* annual “Best of Philly” schools edition identified Haddon Township High School as number seventeen of the top fifty high schools in the Philadelphia, South Jersey, Delaware area. The selection was strictly an objective one, with the rankings generated from a number of quantifiable variables. This honor was followed in late December by the *Philadelphia Daily News* which selected the Haddon Township Public Schools as the “People Award Winner” for the best school district in the area. Too often, we tend to focus more on what we need to do better; on those things that are not quite as good as we believe they should be. So it's nice to be reminded that Haddon Township is a good place to live and send kids to school. Maintaining what we have come to know as a “Haddon Township Education” is about to get a whole lot more difficult. What follows is the not so good news.
